Rotation of service, rotation of service!

This simple act is such a spiritual principle of our program that for me, carries so many lessons. For me it is not simply about completing a term of service, but about leaving space for others to experience the growth that I have, to increase humility by not feeding my need to control and do it all, and to learn how to let go. In Many Voices, One Journey it highlights when Lois shared on this topic in the October 1968 issue of Al-Anon Family Groups Forum; her topic was "letting go." She wrote:

If at one time we held the active leadership of our group, it may be particularly hard to "let go." It is so easy to believe that because we have been in Al-Anon for years, we must be qualified to tell others what to do, but our "actions speak louder than words." When taking an inventory, we longtimers need to constantly remind ourselves of this point and ask ourselves if for some personal reason (thoughtlessness, egotism, a desire to dominate) we are still telling others what to do and how to do it."

As we approach elections in our Area, it is my hope that we will keep the spiritual concept of "rotation of service" in the forefront of our minds, hearts, and actions. I believe if we all do this, we will continue to grow new leaders at every level, group, district, and Area.

I have been pondering the definition of the word *fellowship: a friendly association*, *especially with people who share one's interests*. Coming into the program of Al-Anon, I had only one interest- and it wasn't friendly! My interests are varied and numerous now. I am interested in where and how we come together to do Al-Anon's 12th Step work while meeting, greeting, and renewing friendships with those whom I share a common interest. The structure of Al-Anon Family Groups, Inc.- the groups, districts, and areas compounds our ability to do 12th Step work and they give us opportunities to have *fellowship*.

There are five readings on *Fellowship* in our new daily reader - *A Little Time for Myself*. I took quotes from each of them to share with you about *fellowship*: "Al-Anon is called a fellowship of equals. To recover, we meet as equals. We each have value, purpose and equal importance in Al-Anon. We have in common that we have been affected by the family disease of alcoholism. Focusing on what I have in common with others helps me see each of us as equals regardless of our differences. Al-Anon service gives me the opportunity to work with others in a spirit of humility, knowing that I'm neither more nor less than anyone else. When our group needs something done, individuals volunteer. When we want to do something bigger, more of us volunteer. "

*Fellowship* enhances my AWSC/Assembly experience. I look forward to seeing all of you at the upcoming April AWSC and the May Assembly to get those hugs, to have conversations, to renew old friendships and make new ones!!

### **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

Hello Georgia Area!!! I'm so excited to be embarking on this final year of the current panel, and as always, the BOT continues working hard for Georgia Al-Anon. Since the last Newsletter Report in November, the BOT has been working on the following:

The BOT approved a Finance Committee Work Group report concerning standardizing the Ample Reserve recommendations for the different Area entities. Because the recommendations of this report affect a prior motion from Assembly, they will be presented for approval by AWSC and Assembly in April and May.



In January, our outgoing BOT Treasurer Levon C worked very hard to get all the information together quickly for our end of year financial report, so that it could be approved by the BOT and presented for affirmation at January Assembly.

A separate Finance Committee Work Group is currently working on a position description for a bookkeeper who will help the treasurers for AFG entities with accounting data entry. Because we will now have two AFGG, Inc employees, we are also working with our pro bono attorneys to craft an employee handbook.

We are currently in close dialogue with the Marriott, the site of Area Assembly in Macon, to finalize contracts for the next panel and address some of the recent concerns that have popped up at the past two Assemblies, such as AV and internet issues.

Finally, one of the main goals of the Board of Trustees this year is to develop a Vision Statement for AFG, Inc. This will be addressed at our BOT retreat later this year.

As always, I end any report I give to the Area with a call to service. My personal service work on the Board of Trustees has been so incredibly fulfilling and has helped my Al-Anon program tremendously. Every year, two positions are available for service as a Trustee at Large to the Board. The resume forms can be found on the area website, ga-al-anon.org, under Member Documents, then BOT Documents. ### GROUP RECORDS

The Area ended the year 2023 with 235 active Al-Anon groups and 9 active Alateen groups. In 2023, ten new Al-Anon groups were registered, three of which are Spanish speaking. One new Alateen group was registered. The number of groups that became inactive is ten.

At the September 17, 2023, Area Assembly business meeting, four motions concerning accepting permanent electronic groups (PEGs) into the Al-Anon Family Groups of Georgia (AFGG) Service Structure were voted on and accepted. As a result, PEGs are now accepted in Area 11.

Several groups in the Area continue to meet under the "temporarily meeting online due to Covid 19 restrictions" designation that WSO put in place in March 2020. Now that the Area accepts PEGs, these groups are encouraged to make a group conscience decision to return to meeting in person, meeting in person with an electronic component in the room (hybrid), or change to a permanent electronic location.

Prior to the September 2023 decision, some groups in the Area made the group conscience decision to become an electronic group registered in the Global Electronic Area (GEA.) It is now possible for these electronic groups to transfer from the GEA to the Georgia Area. It is also possible for a PEG in Georgia to transfer to the GEA. Meaning, the current position holders, myself included as District Representative, will be an active participant thru the transition, and continuing to attend those meetings with the new position holder, that they are in place to support (District Meetings, AWSC, Area Assembly, and Group meetings / events).

Service is a valuable part of recovery. Most who are in a position of service recognize it. What we are faced with and challenged with to "attract" new leaders, I feel comes from those in the current position(s) – to make a way to talk about the actual position and what it entails.

What is working for my home group and really at the District level as well, is breaking down piece by piece, a little bit at a time – so some don't feel so overwhelmed that their Service Work commitment, and it is a commitment, ends up doing the opposite in the Al-Anon Recovery than the intention of it being a vital "link" in their recovery.



About 70 people attended the 4-hour workshop on Saturday, February 2024. Many were new members to our program, who traveled a good distance. They came to our workshop hoping to have an exciting new Al-Anon experience. They left full of hope and enthusiasm.

As in previous workshops, the three discussion leaders were really creative to engage even the teens that were there.

Ambar E. presented Step 10. She started with the old-fashioned donkey & the tail children's game. We formed small groups of 5 to 6 in which we shared the answer to the questions she gave you. She then called on one person per group to share with the audience.

Barbara M. started her Step 11 presentation having us stand, and with her soft sweet voice directed a yoga meditation exercise that really quieted our excitement. We got many ideas on how to spark up our prayer and meditation life to get us closer to our Higher Power.

Connie M. did sSep 12. She shared how her small group in Gainesville put their minds together to take actions to spread the Al-Anon message. They talked to several churches in the area with a large number of Hispanics and were able to speak from the pulpit of one of those churches talking to over one thousand people on one weekend as the pastor reinforced the importance of attending. The members who participated in this service opportunity were well prepared, new & old members encouraged each other to face such a big audience. She also shared how even the smallest service task is needed in each group, and how service changes your perspective, gets you out of isolation, and raises your self-esteem.

It was beautiful to see at the end of the workshop the faces of hope and excitement in new and old members, even in the few attendees that had never been to an Al-Anon meeting before. They will surely come back, no doubt about it.

Public Outreach-Esperanza Para Hoy-Gainesville, Ga-District 22

After more than a year during which Esperanza Para Hoy had been a face-to-face meeting, we had not experienced any newcomers to our Spanish meeting. This was concerning considering the overwhelming Hispanic population in Gainesville, Ga. As a group, we decided to have a group conscience and concluded that we needed to reach out to the community to let them know that help is available for family and friends of alcoholics.

We contacted local high-attendance Hispanic churches and were welcomed and encouraged to share the message of Al-Anon after each weekend mass. Fr. Carlos at the S. John Paul II Mission granted permission to share the message of hope for the weekend of the 02/03-02/04. Our whole group was able to be of service. We were able to be at all 7 Masses between Saturday (1) and Sunday (6). The Church provided us with a table in the narthex so that people could find us for more information. We made sure to have enough trifolds with information of what Al-Anon is and the list of the Spanish Al-Anon meetings within Area 11.

In addition, we brought our literature, Al-Anon brochures, and free magazine samples to give out. We calculated that we handed out approximately 100 Al-Anon-District22 trifolds. By the end of the weekend, we were all exhausted and tired but thrilled we had been able to bring hope to those who needed it. For our following Friday meeting (02/09), we had four newcomers in attendance and couldn't have been happier for them and our group! One attendee shared the joy of *finally* finding something for her; having searched near and far for help for her alcoholic relative but never anything for her. She mentioned how grateful she was for deciding to attend the 5pm Mass to find herself hearing the message of hope for families and relatives of alcoholics.





The Friends of Lois Men's Group in McDonough, Georgia was created on a whim in 2020, during the pandemic. A few of the men around McDonough, who were members of different Al-Anon groups throughout the community, thought they might benefit from having a men's meeting. They began meeting informally, on a weekly basis at an outdoor pavilion.

Soon thereafter, the group decided that while they were benefiting greatly from their weekly meeting, Al-Anon's 5th Tradition states that each Al-Anon Family Group has but one purpose, to help families of alcoholics, and one of the ways we do this is by welcoming and giving comfort to families of alcoholics.

With this in mind, the group found an indoor meeting place, and registered with the World Service Office. The small group that started out with only 4 members has grown, and now has 10-12 members who regularly attend each week. When registering their group with the World Service Office, the group elected to adopt their name "Friends of Lois" in memory of our cofounder Lois Wilson.

I was afraid he would never get sober, afraid of being alone, afraid of what was going to happen and afraid of what wasn't. Just afraid. I knew that's what I felt but I didn't know why the emotion was so encompassing. I did not realize how severely I suffered from the disease of alcoholism. I was even afraid to sit at the table with those who were already in the room so I quickly sat on the couch by the door as soon as I walked in and cried through the first few meetings. Fear had literally paralyzed me at one time years prior so I knew the power it could have and I always felt I was circling the drain.


I remember every moment of that first meeting. I remember because I had the gift of desperation. I knew this was my last stop and I was prepared to do anything. As I walked in the people there were chatting and laughing. I will always be grateful because I know if they looked like I felt I may not have stayed and been blessed with the hope I was given right from the start. That group and those people provided me a foundation I can never repay if I spend the rest of my life trying. The AA community was a tremendous part of that as well and I owe them the same debt of gratitude in so very many ways.

I was embraced into the fellowship by them all and taken into the program by a loving sponsor who led me through the steps. They taught me the importance of being of service by asking me at probably my 3rd or 4th meeting to help put out literature and wash cups and ashtrays. Yeah, that was a minute ago LOL. This "job" helped me feel a part of that I had not felt in a very long time. It got me there early and kept me after most others had left and therefore provided me 3 meetings in one. Something I still do today unless not possible. I was later privileged to serve that group as GR and Treasurer as well as my district and area.

Eight years later, we moved to Georgia not knowing a soul in recovery and only one other person from home who had relocated a few years before. Because of the foundation I was given I knew the only way to plug in was service so I went to my first district meeting and area assembly within 3 weeks and found my second home group which remains so 29 years later.

We are currently experiencing a shift which initiated with the pandemic as I understand is true of many but I keep doing what I was taught and know to do which is show up on a regular basis, remain tradition bound and serve.

Why do I love my home group? Because they are my family and they have taught me how to love myself and others when I did not feel and sometimes was not loveable. With gratitude, Linda G.

I've been a member of the Southside Serenity Seekers in Fayetteville for over 30 years... wow! I can't believe it's been that long! As I write my thoughts here, I'm smiling as my mind reflects on all the joy, unity, forgiveness, acceptance that I've received and continue to receive from my home group members.

It's the <u>one group</u> that accepts me for ALL of who I am; I don't have to hide any aspect of myself; they accept me however I show up. I still remember when I came to my first Al-Anon meeting. My wife had recently left me and I was left with four kids I barely knew to raise by myself. I was angry, afraid but most of all I was alone. I had no sense of belonging and no place I could really feel at home. I couldn't even feel at home in my own house! So when I walked into that first meeting I was feeling pretty dejected.

I am so grateful that the people in that little meeting welcomed me like they did. The didn't tell me what I had to do, what to wear or what the dues were. Instead they told me they were glad I was there, to keep coming back and that they loved me. And I just kept going.

I didn't know it but there happened to be another meeting right down the street from me. I could have gone there for my first meeting but instead God led me to what was to become my home group. I obviously didn't know what a "home group" was or that I needed one. I just know that I felt at home and loved in that little room.

I soon got a sponsor and began to work the steps. Not only did he take me through the steps, he also taught me the history of AA and Al-Anon as well as the history of my group. It gave me an even deeper understanding and love for Al-Anon taught me the importance of having a home group.

It wasn't long before I began to find ways of being of service to my group. At first it was simple things like making the coffee, cleaning the ash trays and setting up the chairs. Then after a while I began to chair meetings. Soon I had the privilege of serving as my groups GR. And I grew in my program and I grew to love my home group even more.

Then there came a day when I had to move away from my beloved home group. My job had taken me out of Alabama and into Georgia. It was perhaps one of the most difficult things I had ever done. I left the comfort of my home and found myself in a place where I knew no one.



I didn't know any of the people I worked with nor did I know anyone in the program. Once again I was feeling very much alone.

But my sponsor had taught me well. I began to visit as many groups as I could find. Naturally they didn't do everything exactly like my group back home had done things and that took some getting used to. Eventually I found myself in a speaker meeting one Tuesday night. I'm very hard of hearing so I always try and sit on the front row. The lady speaking that night got out maybe three sentences and I knew that I wanted to go where ever she was going. It turned out it was about twenty minutes from me which was perfect. I had been used to driving 45 minutes one way so this was a piece of cake.

The first night I walked in it felt just like my meeting back home. No, they didn't do everything just like at home and I must admit it took some getting used to but soon I settled into my new meeting. It became my new home group. Once again I had the privilege of serving as GR and I began to get involved at my area assembly which also quite different from what I was used to.

Then came the pandemic. Like most groups we had to stop meeting in person and we had to find new ways of staying connected. Both our meeting and our area assembly had to resort to alternative ways of staying connected. Electronic meetings became the norm and it felt so impersonal. I felt so isolated and I missed the warm hugs of my home group. Fortunately we were able to make it through that awful time and we are happily meeting once again in person. Sadly it had a devastating affect on our group. It was very slow getting back to meeting in person and many people dropped out.

Today our meeting is much smaller than it used to be. Our meeting location moved and things are different than it used to be. However my sponsor's guidance and love has helped me deal with the many changes and still keep to the traditions he instilled in me.

What does my home group mean to me? It means a place where I can really be myself without fear of judgment. It means I have a place where I can be of service to my group and to Al-Anon as a whole. We still get newcomers and I am there to see when they finally "get it". My very best friends are in my home group. I get a great deal of comfort from having a place where I belong. It is truly a place I call home. Phillip W.

I didn't know what I expected to find at Al-Anon, but I didn't expect so many people. Seeing them, I decided I wasn't going to talk, but I did. The kindness, acceptance, and support from a room full of strangers amazed me. Little did I know I was starting a journey that would take me to places I never imagined.

### Title: The Importance of Getting Names Right: A Sign of Respect and Connection

In the world of communication, there is a fundamental aspect that often gets overlooked but holds immense significance – getting someone's name right. Whether it's in a casual conversation, a business setting, or any other social interaction, the way we address others speaks volumes about our respect and attention to detail.

Think about the last time someone mispronounced or misspelled your name. How did it make you feel? More importantly, how did it affect your perception of the person addressing you? Getting someone's name wrong can create a sense of discomfort, embarrassment, or even offense. It sends a message that the person addressing you hasn't taken the time or effort to properly acknowledge your identity.

Names are more than just labels; they are integral parts of our identity. They carry our heritage, culture, and personal history. When I was a child my family called me "Pat." That's what everyone called me. When I was about 30 YO I decided that Pat was a child's name and that I wanted to be called "Patrick." Everyone in my family eventually made the difficult change (with the exception of my Mother and another sibling).

In the summer of 1951 Lois and Anne compiled the first piece of literature titled *Purposes* and suggestions for Al-Anon Family Groups (P-13). It was the first time the name Al-Anon was used. The word "Al-Anon" came from a contraction of the words "Alcoholics" and "Anonymous."

In conclusion, getting someone's name right is not just a matter of correctness; it's a sign of respect, empathy, and appreciation for their identity. It's a small yet powerful way to foster connections, build relationships, and create inclusive environments. So, let's make it a priority to honor and acknowledge the names of those around us, recognizing the significance they hold in shaping who we are.

So the name Al-Anon is a contraction and should always be hyphenated.
